What a busy year again for Team YEAT!

Our schools have gone from strength to strength, with all of our founder schools now being accredited by Nurture UK. Airy Hill School have also achieved the Rights Respecting School Silver Award.

Our schools have continued to strengthen their unique identities – Lealholm is now also a Farm School, with a programme of planned visits to different farms, West Cliff have revamped their beach curriculum , Airy Hill acquired chickens at the request of the children, Oakridge have developed their gardening area and Castleton and Glaisdale have enhanced their forest and moor provision. All of our schools share a core curriculum, but it is very much personalised to their own unique communities.

This year we have been very mindful of the cost of living crisis, and as such we have introduced initiatives whereby the cost of school is reduced for parents. This includes subsidised trips, costume days with recycled costumes, uniform banks and book lending libraries. We will continue to develop this initiative this year under the title of 'Inclusive Action' (the name was created by the Y6 children at West Cliff)


We would like to thank our children, parents and staff this year for their ongoing and unwavering support.

Nurturing our environment and making new friends

At Oakridge, our children have been nurturing our school grounds and the living creatures that live within it. As part of our Garden School curriculum, every child has created a bird feeder to help birds through the cold winter. The children have also been helping Mr Everson maintain the trees in our grounds removing their plastic coverings and trimming off low hanging branches. The children have also planted horse chestnut trees and are very excited by the incredible brussels sprouts they have grown which will be shared around on Christmas Dinner day!

As ethical citizens, KS2 at Oakridge have taken part in the recycling game. They learned about the harm plastic can do to our environment and learned lots of practical strategies to reduce, reuse, recycle. As part of their PSHE curriculum, the children in KS2 became trained first aiders learning lots of practical skills to use in an emergency. They had great fun learning these vital skills.

It took real bravery for our football team to combine with Lealholm for the first time and take part in the Whitby School event in October. The boys started the afternoon learning one anothers' names but left top of their group and having played some excellent football.

COULD YOU SUPPORT ONE OF OUR ACADEMY SCHOOLS BY BECOMING A GOVERNOR?

WHAT DO GOVERNORS DO?

Governors, support the Trustees to set the aims and objectives for the school or group of schools, ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction. They set the policies and targets for achieving those aims and objectives, monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making, and act as a source of challenge and support to the headteacher.

They must be prepared to adopt the Nolan principles of public life: selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership. Be committed to their role and young people. They need to be able to work collaboratively, with inquiring thought processes and able to be creative and innovative in problem solving.

WHAT IS THE TIME COMMITMENT?

On average the time commitment is five to eight hours per month. This includes meetings, background reading and school visits. Governance is a voluntary role and therefore it is not paid.

WHO CAN BE A GOVERNOR?

Anyone aged 18 or over can apply to be a governor and you do not need to be a parent. There is no requirement for you to have an understanding of the education system, just the necessary skills, character and time to contribute.


BECOME A TRUSTEE OR SCHOOL GOVERNOR
