Our Rights Respecting School 🚬











Children's rights are at the heart of everything we do!

Pupils at Airy Hill have been ethical this term, as we have been focusing on Article 12- every child has the right to have a say on matters affecting them and to have their views taken seriously.

We devised a pupil survey with our Rights Respecting Ambassadors who shared the surveys with all children in school. The surveys were completed and then analysed by our ambassadors. We found that all pupils felt safe in school and that they believed that our rights respecting curriculum made them respect others who were different to them. They did say they would like a say in the purchase of new play equipment for the playground which is something our Rights Respecting Ambassadors are now going to do!

We have been fulfilling our Airy Aims of representing the school at sport. Every pupil at Airy Hill has represented the school at a competition or festival this year. Most recently, all of key stage two has competed at the cross-country event and our Year 3 and 4 hockey teams finished first and second in the recent hockey tournament. We are very proud of our achievements this term. Our school choir have been representing our school with pride. One of our pledges is to give cultural experiences to our children. Most recently, our choir competed at the Eskdale festival, finishing in second place with their version of 'Yellow Submarine' by the Beatles.

Guests included former headteachers who spoke highly of how the school looked and presented itself in the community. We're pleased to have our personal development praised in the report, pupils continue to experience activities above and beyond the National Curriculum. We are proud to remain one of the 34 national English Hubs, dedicated to improving English and fostering a love of reading in schools. Through specialist support, training, and resources, we help schools develop early reading, phonics, and a strong reading culture.

We are delighted to welcome Bobbi Walker and Charley Metcalfe as new Literacy Specialists. Both bring extensive expertise and a deep passion for early reading, supporting schools in creating enriching reading environments.

In January, we hosted a successful Reading for Pleasure Conference, bringing together educators and literacy experts to inspire a lifelong love of reading in children. With insights from Professor Teresa Cremin, we explored key strategies to foster child-led reading and build strong reading communities. Thank you to everyone who contributed!

Over the past year, we have provided intensive support to new partner schools, offering specialist modelling and coaching to enhance early reading instruction. Additionally, our Literacy Specialists have completed training in supporting pupils with speech and language needs and those with SEND, ensuring tailored support for all learners.

As a hub, we are proud to have met our improvement target, strengthening reading outcomes and nurturing lifelong readers. Together, we are shaping a brighter future for young readers.

COULD YOU SUPPORT ONE OF OUR ACADEMY SCHOOLS BY BECOMING A GOVERNOR?

WHAT DO GOVERNORS DO?

Governors, support the Trustees to set the aims and objectives for the school or group of schools, ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction. They set the policies and targets for achieving those aims and objectives, monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making, and act as a source of challenge and support to the headteacher.

They must be prepared to adopt the Nolan principles of public life: selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership. Be committed to their role and young people. They need to be able to work collaboratively, with inquiring thought processes and able to be creative and innovative in problem solving.

WHAT IS THE TIME COMMITMENT?

On average the time commitment is five to eight hours per month. This includes meetings, background reading and school visits. Governance is a voluntary role and therefore it is not paid.

WHO CAN BE A GOVERNOR?

Anyone aged 18 or over can apply to be a governor and you do not need to be a parent. There is no requirement for you to have an understanding of the education system, just the necessary skills, character and time to contribute.
